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

### "Re the article in the February TRead from Racing Car News, August, 1961 ... " .

" ... actually, the first social outing was a drive from meeting at Standard Cars showroom in William Street, in the Sydney CBD, out to the Kurrajong Hotel for lunch to then assemble down the road at a large field for photos and to then return to William St. It was a whole day, and I was the lead car of (if I recall correctly) 12TR's with Ray Cook at the rear keeping the convoy together and spot on the speed limit. (no fast cars, no slow cars.).

Around a couple of months later the same crew went to Nowra via Moss Vale and Kangaroo Valley, had lunch at the beach at Nowra then a lovely police escort (one patrol car in front of me and one behind Ray keeping our cars in 3<sup>rd</sup> gear for that only great TR rumble) through the main drag and heading back north. Once we reached the derestricted area the police pulled over and waved us on. We returned to Sydney via the highway with a detour through The Royal National Park (was in those days a derestricted area and you would only be booked if it could be proven that you were

driving it a manor dangerous) Needless to say, it was 'pedal to the metal' to complete a great day.

### Now back to that article.

That venue was used by the club on a couple of occasions when we had been requested to move from Standard Cars, bearing in mind that our official club calendar was set as the July/June financial calendar, and we were looking for a venue to hold our AGM and trophy presentations. Graham White lived in that suburb at the time, and as we needed somewhere(?) in a hurry, hired it for the July meeting and presentation night. As we were still in need of a meeting room, we also had a tentative arrangement for further use. It was a great little hall and to cover costs for that meeting it was decided to hold a dance night in August. A group of musos, 4 or 5, supplied by my mate Ron Cunningham (played 2<sup>nd</sup> band at White City for Frank Sinatra looked for practice venues) so we had a top *free* band.

Invited were the clubs that we had invites to with their club days at that time being Northshore, Manly and Eastern Suburbs of which my old mate Max Stahl was a committee member of the latter and owner of Racing Car News. (that is why we had lots of mention in that publication over that period)."



It's that time of year again when our Gnoo Blas Car club in Orange holds its annual show & shine and dinner on the Saturday and then a run on the Sunday which makes for a very full and enjoyable weekend. On Friday the 10th of February after fixing a slight issue with the car we finely headed off from the Central Coast at about 9.30am on a fine sunny morning in our 1974 mimosa yellow Triumph Stag and arrived at Orange at about 1.45pm having contended with some heavy traffic in places. We dropped in to see one of Rob's nephews and then a visit to one of his brothers before heading around to yet another brother's place where we stayed for the weekend. His brother, Wally moved some cars around so the Stag fitted nicely in the garage while Shirley prepared a lovely dinner for us.

On Saturday we woke to a fine morning and after breakfast headed out to Sir Jack Brabham Park. It was only about 8.15am when we arrived and there was already a lot of cars in the park and queued up at the gate, but we moved in pretty quickly and found a spot to park in the long line of Gnoo Blas Club cars. Wally and Shirley were also there putting up their tent as they were helping sell tickets for the Can Assist charity. We did manage to walk around most of the cars, trucks and motorbikes with many outstanding vehicles there. The quality and number of vehicles was amazing. Also, on display was 'Albert' the 1947 double decker bus which has a very interesting history. Two people who actually toured in the bus were guest speakers at the dinner that night. The registered number of vehicles displayed on the day was 530 but I'm pretty sure there was actually a lot more vehicles there on the day. They also had a helicopter for sightseeing tours over the park and around the local district of Orange. After catching up with many old friends we headed back for a rest at about 2.30pm to be ready to go out that evening to the dinner.

Wally gave us a lift over to the Waratah Sports Club where there were 197 people for the dinner. Their first guest speaker was Sue Ransom who began her career with rallying and then transitioned to tarmac and made 5 Great Race Starts before switching to drag racing through the 1970's & 80's. She drove a variety of cars and entered the Bathurst 1000 five times between 1973 and 1980. Then professional Jet Funny Car and Top Fuel Dragster driver in the USA in the 1980's. In between she was a motoring journalist working in public relations at Ford and Mazda and played an instrumental role in creating the ABC TV motoring program Torque.

Their next guest speakers were Stewart and Natalie Baker who actually travelled in the bus 'Albert' to Australia in 1972 at a cost of 145 pounds each to travel from Dover on the 14th of November 1972 to Australia via Turkey, Iran, Afghanistan via the Khyber Pass, India and Singapore where Albert was put on a ship to Australia. What an amazing experience and incredible journey it must have been. Not to mention that all these years later they are still together! At the end of the evening our friend, Peter Barrett gave us a lift back to Wally's place in his very early little 2 door Toyota Corolla.

Sunday morning was yet another bright sunny day as we headed down to line up in front of Cook Park for the start of the run. There were approximately 60 cars that made the first leg of the run out to Lake Canobolas for morning tea. While there we had a chance to have a chat with Sue Ransom and get a photo of her next to our **Stag**. Sue is one of those people who are really down to earth and so easy to talk to. And when you stop and think that when she was racing it must have been extremely hard for her to break into the sport not to mention motoring journalism as this was a very male dominated sport.

From the Lake we headed off on the next leg of the run but luckily, we left the lake a bit late and we had only travelled a few kilometres and cars were coming back so we turned around and headed to the Robin Hood club for lunch. # What sort of future did Triumph have in mind with its XL90 concept?

Introduced in 1967, it was meant to peer 25 years into the future.

Dredging up older predictions about the future in automotive form can prove both entertaining and enlightening, and Richard Bartrop suggested another one to look at: the 1967 Triumph XL90. "Presented as the car of 25 years hence, it was almost a dead ringer for a Chevy minivan from 1992," he wrote.

Indeed, the XL90 looked futuristic and nothing like Triumph's contemporary crop of cars. With its one-box and heavily format sloped front, it did have the look of a Dustbuster U-body minivan—itself often described as futuristic—but it was meant more as а prediction what of advanced technologies might be incorporated into automobiles rather than the look and shape



of them. Designed in-house by Triumph engineer Ed Pepall, the XL90 ostensibly included a "sealed-for-life" drivetrain, pneumatic controls for suspension and brakes, "handgrip" steering, ultrasonic windshield cleaning, and automatic guidance and speed control.

Exactly what any of those meant or how practical those features would be is anybody's guess. As Claus Ebberfeld <u>at viaRetro</u> noted, Triumph's suggested powerplant for the XL90 was its own 2-liter six-cylinder, an engine that would not easily fit anywhere in Pepall's design or go more than a few thousand miles without servicing. Then again, if the drivetrain is sealed, then the lifetime of the drivetrain becomes the lifetime of the vehicle, and perhaps

the XL90 was (and all cars of the early 1990s were) intended to be far more disposable than vehicles of the late Sixties.

Automation and driver-assist systems have long been fantasies for automotive prognosticators, and given that experimental versions of those technologies appeared in British Leyland demonstration vehicles by 1971, it's likely those systems were already in development when Pepall designed the XL90. Pneumatic suspension was nothing new either, though perhaps Pepall envisioned a less costly and less problem-prone system than Cadillac's late-Fifties Air Dome feature.

The windshield cleaning system sounds intriguing. Ostensibly, the windshield would vibrate at a specific ultrasonic frequency that would shake off raindrops and dirt and make windshield wipers unnecessary. Makes sense that a British carmaker would be on the forefront of rain-deflecting technology. To our knowledge, nothing along those lines has been proposed or tried in other concept or production vehicles—windshield wipers are a proven technology, after all—though McLaren claimed to do something similar with the windshieldless Elva and its Air Active Management System which directed a stream of air claimed to protect the occupants of the open-topped car.

Ultimately, the XL90 proved to be little more than idle speculation. While it appeared at the Earls Court Motor Show that year, perhaps more people saw it in a print advertisement in which the company billed it as "the shape of Triumph to come," claiming that "its ideas are so advanced that many of them are still only sketches in a designer's notebook. Or experiments in the earliest stages of laboratory research. But all of them could be—and

probably will be—the talking points of Triumph cars at the Motor Show of 1992."


Nobody ever saw the XL90 as a full-size vehicle. Instead, it was a scale model cleverly photographed to look larger. That model today exists in the British Motor Museum in England.


