




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President's Report August

Motorsport Report

Hello All,

It was deeply disappointing that it was necessary for us to cancel our round of the CSCA event at Sydney Dragway on the 9th of July because of the low number of entries we had received at the closing date. We required 40 entrants for Sydney Dragway to open the venue for us and we required 60 entries to reach a financial



breakeven point. At close of entries, we only had 28 entrants. Encouragingly 14 of those entrants were from TSOA. Thank you to the TSOA member who did enter. I am investigating an alternative for those interested parties- more on this later.

On a personal level I was competing at SMSP on the Saturday before our event in my Honda Integra Type R, and the plan was to compete in the Honda at Sydney Dragway on the Sunday. However, the Honda suffered some serious engine damage on the Saturday, so I was not going to be able to compete on the Sunday- the frustration of motor racing!

The next CSCA Event will be Round 4 at Sydney Motorsport Park on 19 August run by Club Lotus. At the time of writing this report there are 7 TSOA members who have entered. As this event will use the full SMSP track, Club Lotus requires 22 people to perform the flag marshal duties. If you can assist for even part of the day to fill one of these roles, please contact me and I will pass on the contact at Club Lotus. They will appreciate your support.

The remainder of the CSCA events for 2023 are-

- Rd 4- 19 August- SMSP GP (Club Lotus)
- Rd 5- 30 September- Pheasant Wood (MGCC Sydney)
- Rd 6- 22 October- SMSP North (Jaguar Drivers Club)

In other motorsport news some pleasing progress at two locations- Firstly at Circuit Italia, Raymond Terrace the bitumen surface of the track is well advanced with an expectation the venue will be operational before the end of 2023. The following photograph is vison of bitumen <u>actually</u> being laid at the track, this sure is a moral boosting sight.



Meanwhile at Wakefield Park Goulburn, the new owners there have started work on major earthworks to improve drainage and build noise attainment walls as part of the agreed works with the Council and local residents. 2024 could give us both circuits to utilise! Great news indeed.

I had been saving this little titbit for inclusion in this edition of **TRead** which should have also had a lengthy motorsport report on our own Dragway event organised by Phil Larmour at Sydney Dragway. Alas this was not to be (per previous page), however I feel that this article is worth a 'read' anyway. And it would be interesting to speculate about just what might have happened had this car visited us out there at Eastern Creek ... ??

Legendary Turbo V8 TR6 is a Drag Strip Demon A massive 8.0-liter engine moves this small classic.

The TR6 is a special little car, while it isn't exactly known for its incredible horsepower or low quarter-mile times it is still a very popular piece. These cars are what are known as driver's cars, this means that while they aren't the fastest mean machine on four wheels, they are still really fun to drive. Some other examples of this kind of car would be the Mazda Miata, Subaru Brz, and the Honda S2000. These cars, just like the TR6, had very minimal horsepower but quickly became extremely popular with those 'in the know,' for their handling and downright fun driving experience.

However, this is still not good enough for some people, this is best exemplified by today's example.

This tiny particular British cruiser has been equipped with a fire-breathing V8 engine from Pontiac and is ready to destroy any competition that might come its way. Under the hood of this incredible car is a 488ci, 8-liter, Pontiac V8 with a 94mm turbocharger which pushes out crazy horsepower numbers. Mated to the engine is a 480L manual transmission which spins the drag tires wrapped around a set of Weld Racing Wheels.

With the upgraded throttle body, gigantic engine, and huge turbocharger this thing uses up a lot of fuel. That's why the trunk of the car has been fitted with 2-8.5 gallon fuel tanks. Another cool feature this car brings to the table is that it is street legal, this means that you could see this high-performance masterpiece zooming past you on the highway. After an ear-deafening burnout and some 'oohs' and 'ahs' from the crowd, the car can complete a quarter-mile pass in just 9.51 seconds.

The funniest thing about this car is that after it's done demolishing the competition it carries a trailer back to the garage. This is one of the coolest cars we've ever seen and we hope to see more cars like this in the future, the world needs more high horsepower drag strip destroyers like this one.

I borrowed the article from the May edition of TCCV's TRUMPET magazine which had in turn borrowed it from <u>www.motorious.com</u>. Obviously this is an American article using some old imperial measurements for the engine stats nevertheless the *'in just 9.51 seconds'* is instantly recognisable as *... fast. ed.*

TSOA - Christmas in July 2023 at the Carrington Hotel Katoomba Phil Moore

Thanks to the early explorers Blaxland, Lawson and Wentworth, we all followed our way along the well-beaten track called the Great Western Highway, to the Blue Mts for the TSOA Triumph Club's "Christmas in July" luncheon at the Carrington Hotel in Katoomba.

In 1815, following much the same route as surveyed by G.W.Evans, the first person to cross the Blue Mts by a horse-drawn vehicle was Gov. Macquarie with his wife and an entourage, who made a Vice-Regal Tour of Inspection of the new road, built in 1814 by William Cox with the help of 30 convicts. When the governor reached Bathurst, they'd travelled 163 kms and crossed over 12 bridges.

On today's journey, as the highway climbs to higher elevations, with John Stokes' white Stag in the rear vision mirror, we drove through villages named after those 3 explorers, Blaxland Lawson. and Wentworth. As we slowed down to 60kms at Lawson, I asked my navigator, Seiko, a trivia question ..."*How did this town get it's name?"* ...to which she replied; "*the name comes from the 'Lawson' convenience stores in Japan*!". After correcting the story, we were soon arriving at our destination, driving the Stag into the carpark of the Carrington Hotel, just as Allan Wright and Renate pulled up in their green TR250.

As we entered the hotel from the chilly carpark, the rush of warm air was welcomed by all, when entering the hotel foyer and past the bar to the grand dining hall. With a glass of gluhwein for getting in the mood of Yulefest, a plentiful 4-course menu was served, while the resident planist played a selection of popular songs and rallied the crowd into a singalong.

It was a successful combination of the wine, food, music and the warm company of the TSOA members, who enjoyed a festive event in the atmosphere of a grand hotel from a bye-gone era. As the luncheon event drew to a close around 3pm, most TSOA members made their way home. while a few of us stayed overnight in Katoomba.

The Carrington Hotel rooms were full, so we stayed with an Airbnb host nearby in Yosemite. On Sunday evening, we found a restaurant halfway down Katoomba St, called "Aunty Ed's" Joining us for dinner, John and Debbie Stokes, enjoyed a great menu, while listening to a local jazz guitarist, John Stuart and a female singer who performed jazz standards, latin songs, with Seiko requesting songs by Carol King and Nora Jones.





TSOA's annual Yulefest Lunch at the Carrington Hotel was obviously a great success judging by the sea of smiling faces shown here plus the rather obvious point that even the

camera managed to get got just a little bit blurry on the day.!

I do not know what is going on here ... ??



I've researched the following history of the Carrington Hotel;

The "Great Western Hotel", containing 60 rooms was built in 1882 on a land grant of 50 acres. The Governor of NSW, Lord Carrington, visited the hotel in 1886. He gave consent to change the name to the Carrington Hotel. From 1885, additions were made to the hotel which included the dining hall, drawing rooms, 119 bedrooms, 7 suites, 2 tennis courts and the flower gardens.

In the 1890's. hotelier Sir John Smith acquired the Carrington Hotel as well as the Imperial Hotel at Mt Victoria. Smith was also a motor car enthusiast. His car collection included a Pierce Arrow, Rolls Royce, Bentley, Cadillac &

Lassalle.

Back in the early 1980's, during my days of working in the advertising industry, I arrived at Katoomba Station aboard a steam train that was chartered for the ad agency's Staff Xmas Party. As I recall, the fancy costumed event was themed "Murder on the Orient Express" and was held in the grand dining hall of the then very run-down Carrington Hotel. A few years later, the hotel was closed down and remained closed for decades. I don't think its closure was due to a mock murder or the wild partying of 40years ago?

The Carrington Hotel in all her glory today is the only restored 19th century grand hotel resort still in use in NSW, and possibly in Australia.

What would a Triumph roadster look like today if the British firm was still operating? CarExpert

That's the question British automotive design consultancy firm **makkina** has aimed to answer with its **TR25 Concept**, celebrating the defunct brand's 100th anniversary.

makkina is a consultancy firm for some of the world's biggest car companies, working on a confidential basis on design briefs and development.

Unveiling its creation at the Goodwood Festival of Speed, **makkina** said the model that inspired the design challenge of the TR25 concept was the 1950s 'Jabbeke' TR2 MVC575.







Driven by Sir Stirling Moss, the TR2 broke the speed record for a 2.0-litre production sports car in 1953 in Jabbeke, Belgium.

A celebration of the great British roadster', the TR25 is an all-electric roadster model that shares its chassis and 137kW rear-mounted electric motor with the axed <u>BMW i3 S hatchback</u>.



The TR25 concept car, although decidedly modern with its scissor doors and geometric wheel design, has adopted the headlights and exaggerated haunches and body proportions of the original racer.



Like the TR2, the TR25 has a semi-enclosed cockpit with a driver's side windshield, but it has also gained an optional hidden flip-out passenger jump seat under a folding door.








A classic racer has been used as inspiration for the interior panel, with a digitised yet simple cluster providing only necessary information such as road speed, charge and range to recall an era before touchscreen infotainment when the driver was at the `centre of the experience'.



The body has been constructed of 'F1-grade' composite materials, including the central spine to provide structural rigidity in the cockpit, and **makkina** claims special attention has been paid to power-to-weight distribution.

Much as there's an i3 underneath the TR25's shapely bodywork, there's a connection between the BMW and Triumph brands.

BMW has held the rights to the Triumph Motor Company brand since 1994 when it acquired the Rover Group, and has held onto it even after selling off the remainder of the parent group.

Despite this, BMW has not attempted to revive the historic brand aside from permitting **makkina** to reimagine its historic model.

The Triumph name, at least for automobiles, has been dormant since 1984. Its last vehicle was a rebadged Honda Ballade sedan called the Acclaim.

makkina's director and founder Michael Ani told <u>Auto Express</u>, "Although not intended for limited production at the moment, the fact that TR25 is based on a BMW platform and powertrain, provides scope to turn our concept into reality should the right opportunity arise."

"Using the BMW i3S platform allows us to create a blend of old and new with the TR2-inspired body shape and the versatile and adaptable powertrain, creating a seamless, fully electric experience," said Mr Ani.

The i3 was considered a pioneer of its segment upon its release in 2014, but it was discontinued without a direct replacement. Australian stock of the carbon-tubbed, coach-door city car dried up at the end of 2021.

Production <u>officially ended last year</u> after 250,000 models, though the i3 nameplate lives on with an electric version of the 3 Series sedan, sold exclusively in China.

Although not an obvious collaboration, **makkina** explained that the Triumph 'Jabekke' TR2 was the creative inspiration for the **makknna** studio and reinterpreting the model on the 70th anniversary of its release was a poetic way for the firm to mark its own 25th anniversary.

2023 TARGA CLASSICA

The 2023 edition of Targa Classica was held in the week leading up to the Australian Grand Prix. Designed to replicate the modern versions of Italy's famous tarmac events the Mille Miglia and Targa Florio, the event took place over four (4) days, criss-crossing Victoria's beautiful country regions and covering a tick over 1100 kms.



This was, however, not just a car tour. It was an intensive test of driving, navigation and competitive regularity speed stages to determine the overall prize winners of the two classes of vehicles – Classica Trofeo (up to 1979) and Legend Trophy (1980 to new), plus a team award.

A key marketing platform for the event was that entrants would be allowed to do a lap of the Albert Park AGP circuit as part of the weekend's F1 program. Disappointingly, this was cancelled in the days leading up to the start *.. a real bummer!*

The event started at Healesville with a loop around the Yarra Valley. The weather was ordinary. Day two saw competitors travel from Healesville via Eildon and Bright, before ascending the Great Alpine Road in whiteout

conditions for an overnighter at Mount Hotham. An early morning start on day three took us down the mountain enroute to Mitchelton for dinner, but not before a lap of Winton Raceway. For the final day the sun was up, and the convertible tops were down. It was a condensed version of those preceding it with all cars turning south for the drive to Melbourne via Seymour and a lap of Eastern Lions Go Kart Track.

The oldest car entered was a 1927 Bugatti T35B and the newest a 2020 Audi SQ5. Between those bookends fell an eclectic group of marques including Ferrari, Lancia, Jaguar, Honda, Alfa Romeo, Mercedes Benz and Maserati. Porsche had the greatest number by a wide margin.

There was just one Triumph – this white TR 5 entered by Richard and Anna Emmett.



In all, 60 cars were in Classica Trofeo and 40 in Legend Trophy – a "full" field.

What separated the field in the trophy chase was simple – skill in the regularity events. There were two types of regularity events. The first was driving over a pre-set course (imagine a parking lot) that had been broken up into varying distances (quite small) in a prescribed time, and the second was averaging a certain speed over a defined distance on the open road. To avoid the severe penalties involved electronic timing and recording equipment was essential, as was a touch of experience. Indeed, events like this are just not run in NSW, even at a club level.

Amongst the pre-event favourites were well-known Melbourne motor bike identity David Reidie and former AFL star Leigh Colbert in the Bugatti, long standing Kiwi buddies Brent Morrison and Chris Kerr in a 1958 Porsche 356A Super, and the father/son combination of Rob and Sam Marsh in a 2003 Ferrari 360 Spider. All had significant experience in these types of events. The early market proved accurate as all three took home a piece of silverware from the event.

For my buddy and I, it proved to be a bit of fun, a bit of frustration and a new experience, but without any electronic assistance we were at long

odds to avoid the maximum penalties in every test. But we did pal up with two other first-time entrants to form a team, which, in turn, gave us a larger degree of involvement and a sense of camaraderie.

Is the Targa Classica a genuine Australian classic tarmac event to be revered by all and sundry, or is it an expensive glorified car trial for those wanting something a bit



different? Like cake, the answer is all in the eating. You just have to try it. But be warned, to get the most out of the event you must be prepared – get the right equipment and do some practice!

Q: Do we still need a handwritten pink slip, or can it be digital? All pink slips for Historic and Classic registrations need to be done manually via the handwritten book. These cannot be completed digitally. All AIS providers must have one of these as a business rule.

Q: Does the form 1259 Historic Vehicle declaration have to be original?

This <u>form</u> must be submitted as an original. Photocopies will not be accepted.

Protecting vehicle owners against odometer tampering

Odometer tampering involves the disconnection, resetting or changing of a motor vehicle's display of kilometres it has travelled. It is an offence in NSW to interfere with an odometer reading as it can influence the perceived value and condition of a vehicle.

It's now possible to check the last three odometer readings for free via <u>Check a vehicle registration online</u>.

"These readings are available to everyone and will help protect customers from odometer tampering," said Ruth Clulow, Senior Manager Vehicle Operations. "The readings may show discrepancies between the kilometres travelled – what is displayed on a vehicle's odometer – versus what has been recorded in previous odometer readings."

Vehicle owners that suspect odometer tampering can find out more on the <u>NSW Fair Trading – buying a used car</u> webpage.

Demerit points relief for safe drivers

All unrestricted NSW licence holders – including professional drivers – are eligible for a demerit point trial that aims to reward responsible driving behaviour. During the trial, if an eligible driver maintains an offence free record during the trial period, one demerit point will be removed from their driving record.

The trial will run from 17 January 2023 until 16 January 2024. There is no need to register for the trial, all unrestricted licence holders are automatically included. At the completion of the trial, Transport for NSW will undertake a process to identify those eligible for the deduction of a demerit point. The demerit point deduction is expected to take effect mid-April 2024.Learner and provisional licence holders are not included in the trial as they are subject to strict conditions of the Graduated Licensing Scheme. Safe driving behaviour cannot be underestimated as we work together to create a safer driving environment for all road users and ultimately push road trauma to zero.

Did you know?

All licence holders start with zero demerit points. As a licence holder commits an offence that has a demerit point penalty, the points are then added to their driving record. Demerit points stay active for a three-year period, starting from the date of the offence.

Vale Douglas Brodie

Doug Brodie was an amazing man. He was a great husband to Sue, and they always enjoyed each other's company. The whole family was close, and he was so proud of his children, Tania and Michelle, and his grandchildren, Lachlan, Cameron and Olivia. He especially loved meeting with his grandchildren and spending time with them, always saying that he wanted to be remembered by them – a task



well achieved. He touched everybody whom he met and was a friend of everyone.

Doug was a technical master in every field. He studied as a technician with the then PMG and continued his career to include on-site management positions for 2NR and Radio Australia. His amazing range of skills meant he could fix or invent anything – he loved a technical challenge - from repairing or restoring machinery and electronic equipment to developing a solar controlled door on a chook shed. He was endlessly generous with his skills and his time – he loved being the expert, helping people and seeing people smile due to his efforts. He selflessly gave his time and skills freely and would always achieve what he set out to do, his perseverance and attention to detail was a part of his persona.

This was how we met: I was thoroughly sick of my 10 year restoration of my Triumph TR3A, and then from nowhere I got a call from Doug, who had moved into the area. He asked if he could help me with the electrical wiring – what a question! We worked together for many hours, the car was finally finished, and he and Sue had by then become firm friends of myself and Danute.

He had a love affair with the Triumph marque since 1967, having owned and enjoyed three saloons, but Doug didn't really want to get involved with small sports cars until deciding to <u>restore</u> a Triumph himself. His chosen dealer was offering a very forlorn "basket case" TR3A. This model Triumph brought back memories to him – he went for a ride in one as a kid around 45 years before and found it was <u>so</u> low and <u>so</u> quick in comparison to their family car, a humble Austin A30. He took possession of the TR3A wreck on Mother's Day 1994. A two-and-a-half-year full restoration followed.

In October 1996 the engine fired for the first time and he and Sue were off to the TR Register Concours in Corowa, Victoria. Over the years the "basket case" has received two seconds, two thirds and was the outright winner and Best TR3A at Armidale in 2003. It took first place and the outright concours trophy (the Laurie Cousins Trophy) for the Best TR3A at Thredbo in 2008. Doug could have entered many more concours competitions and won far more trophies if he chose, but that was not his way – he set out to gain the ultimate prize in the TR Register, achieved it, then left it for others to enjoy.

Doug loved the old Triumph and the TR Register concours, completing drives all over much of Australia in the beautiful machine – from Newcastle to Adelaide, Bendigo, Armidale and Thredbo to name a few, plus runs with his local '*Triumphs in the Hunter*' group. Doug and Sue were always popular, and Doug's TR was always immaculate. He then went on to restore a second triumph, a TR7V8, and it too was immaculate.

Doug Brodie provides us all with an example of a life well lived. His whole life has been surrounded by loving friends and family, he spent much of his time doing things he enjoyed doing and at which he excelled, he took great satisfaction from helping others, giving happiness to people around him and to ensuring he left a legacy of wonderful memories for those who knew him.
